

Last week we had reports of more senseless killings in two areas in Ituri Province, 28 miles from Bunia. Dealing with daily stresses of survival, rising costs of food, and living with fear and trauma are at the heart of Bisoke's ministry. "These are the things we face. Life is not easy," says Bisoke.

Donations enabled Holy Trinity to send \$1000 this week for work at the Peace Center. This will provide funding for two seminars.

On Wednesday and Thursday 103 ladies will gather for trauma healing, mutual support and planning for their future. 408 women wanted to attend but with limited space, many will have to wait for another session.



On Friday 103 handicapped will gather for counseling, encouragement and planning for education classes. The number swelled from fifty as more handicapped individuals were identified. Baraka, from the Banyanwishe tribe in the province of South Kivu is the president of the handicapped group in the Rwampara IDP camp. They are very thankful for his leadership.



Twenty leaders in the Rwampara camp are eager for training in peace building and counseling as they learn ways to better serve the displaced in their charge. The Peace Center is recognized for their valuable programs for healing and reconciliation.

There are now six persons who would like to attend the three year Bible training school in Bunia. The cost is \$1500 per year. Katusabe Igwerabona is 45.

Holy Trinity was also able to send \$500 for the BCHC orphan school. Furaaha provides a safe haven for over 1000 students, offering love and hope for over 500 orphans, children of the teachers and paying students.



Teachers are happy to be of use and have jobs and widows are thankful to find purpose in fostering the orphans. Funds are needed for sewing classes, school supplies, salaries for teachers and so many things. We are thankful to be able to contribute. A long term project is improvement of school buildings to meet government standards as well as attract more paying students to help fund the operations.

The well to be placed in Chabusiku is nearly funded. Due to the distance to the village from Bunia, and rising costs in general, the fee for installation has increased. Chabusiku is in a safe area and the need is great. Once begun, construction could be accomplished in a month. This is their present water source.
